River Clean-ups

Gathered by thousands, measured in tons

It's been eight years since Missouri River Relief held our first community clean-up in Easley, MO. Since then, we've brought over 12,000 volunteers to the Missouri River to clean it up, learn from it and restore it.

Volunteers are what make it happen. From old dumpsites and neglected "party spots" to tons of debris washed in by the river in high water. One piece of trash at a time, one person at a time, one hand at a time. It all adds up!

What also adds up is the change in volunteers' hearts. Suddenly they realize that the Missouri River is their river. Their hard work has visible results - dumpsters overflowing with trash; piles of heavy, mudfilled tires; beautiful, pristine riverbanks. **The result is a better river for us all.**

On a trip down the river today, you meet people of every stripe whose first exposure to the river came during MRR river cleanups.

A river that once had almost no friends now has a growing host of passionate protectors, thanks to Missouri River Relief.

Clean-up Highlights A small sample of some of our most exciting events

Mari-Osa Dump Clean-up

162 volunteers attacked the confluence of the Maries and Osage Rivers, cleaning up seven old dumpsites including a retaining wall built of tires. The highlight was a trash "flume" made of a discarded culvert that zoomed full trash cans down a steep bluff.

Siouxland Clean-up

For our second trip to the head of the channelized river, we were welcomed by a huge, organized local crew of river cleaners. One student group, the Siouxland Mudpuppies, was inspired by last year's clean-up.

River Camp Clean-ups

Our mid-Missouri River Camp was bracketed by two clean-ups. The first was a campout/clean-up with Sustain Mizzou, a student environmental group. The following Saturday was a cleanup below the state capitol dome in Jefferson City.

Kansas City Clean-up

The seventh year for our biggest clean-up of the year. With Coca-Cola employees, we started our first large-scale river-trashrecycling effort in KC. Working on both the Missouri and Kansas Rivers, we removed 12 tons of urban trash from the riverbanks.

River Camp

A week of clean-ups, networking and river education in the Manitou Bluffs Conservation Opportunity Area.

One of the highlights was the Sandbar Banquet. As a thank you to our sponsors, partners and friends, we boated 150 folks out to an island for food, fellowship, river talks and great music.

Canoe Races

Recreation on the Missouri River is growing by leaps and bounds. The **Missouri River 340**, a paddler's race across the state of Missouri is one shining example. We brought our crew skills and boats to serve as safety patrol for this 100 hour race. We also served as a safety crew for **Greenway Network's Race for the Rivers.**

Big Muddy Sessions

In partnership with Friends of Big Muddy & Big Muddy National Fish and Wildlife Refuge (NFWR). Monthly presentations are given on Missouri River topics by the experts in their field. History, biology, hydrology, and river uses are just some of the topics. Presenters include: US Geological Survey River Studies, Missouri Dept. of Conservation, Big Muddy NFWR, US Fish & Wildlife Service and more.

Community Festivals

Eco-Art-Fest

This music, arts and education festival is hosted at Cooper's Landing, on the banks of the river. MRR hosted a trash-to-art booth and took festival visitors on educational river trips.

River Excursions

Learning best takes place on the river itself, where every moment brings a new experience.

Missouri River Relief is Missouri Stream Team #1875, one of over 4,000 teams in the state. This year was the 20th Anniversary of the Missouri Stream Team program, a grassroots yet state supported program that trains citizens to monitor and restore their favorite stream.

Stream Teams from dozens of watersheds come to our cleanups, lend their expertise and get



out on the big river. From water quality demonstrations to watershed festival booths to being the only one with a gaspowered chop saw, Stream Teams shine across the state of Missouri.

In return, Missouri River Relief brings our boats and equipment to other Stream Team events, to get the big stuff that doesn't fit in canoes.

In 20 years, Stream Team has matured into a skilled, knowledgeable and statewide force for stream stewardship.


Printed copies are being distributed throughout the country, and the entire manual has been posted online.




