Knowledgeable and experienced instructors will show you how to use river education to integrate science, social studies, English language arts and math in a way that engages students, strengthens their learning and prepares them to be college-ready and career-ready.

Registration Process

Financial Aid

Financial aid is available to qualified participants. To apply for financial aid, download a pdf of the financial aid application; fill it in and mail to P.O. Box 463, Columbia, MO or e-mail to <u>kristen@riverrelief.org</u>.

We will begin awarding financial aid in mid-April and then continue making awards on a rolling basis until all available funds are awarded. We are typically able to notify financial aid applicants of the amount we are able to award within a month of receiving an application. The applicant will then be given a deadline and separate link to register for the course; do NOT register before you are notified of your award.

Tuition

To be inclusive of different schedules and interest, we have created the option of being able to participant in a one day or two-day workshop. Although for the full benefits of this workshop we highly encourage participants to register for both days, as each day bring a unique experience. Each day includes lunch, instruction, materials and supplies. Specifically, on the first day, an on the river experience by motorboat will be included. Please see below a breakdown of the tuition:

What to Expect

To help you be prepared for the activities in which you and other educators will participate, please plan for active learning. For the most satisfying experience, please note that this program requires the following:

- Arrive on Time! Be prepared to learn and be ready to go when you arrive.
- Be a team member! We operate in teams and expect everyone to participate.
- We are place-based and experience-oriented! Our indoor classroom time will be spent exploring through discussions, activities, and lectures, covering a wide variety of topics.
- We are outdoors most of the time! Our outdoor classroom time will be spent investigating many areas of the Missouri River on boats and on foot, so plan accordingly.

Come Prepared



Our workshops are taught outdoors, in *all* weather conditions. After a day in the outdoors, you may wish to have clothes and clean shoes to change into for your drive home, but during the day you will want to have:

- Water bottles
- Sunscreen
- Baseball Cap or Sunhat
- Sturdy footwear
- Light backpack to carry everything
- Light jacket and/or rain jacket
- And dress comfortably for changes in weather.

Missouri River Lesson Plan

A lesson plan is the educator's road map of what students need to learn and how it will be done effectively during your time together. Each educator will be asked to bring a lesson plan that they currently teach that they feel they could connect to the Missouri River. During the workshop educators will have the opportunity to adapt and design their lesson plans, and present out to their fellow workshop participants.

General Policies

Waitlist

Should the workshop reach its capacity, a waitlist will be created. The first person on the waitlist will be notified if a vacancy occurs. If this person does not accept, then we will move down the list.

Cancellation

If you should need to cancel, a refund will not be issued up to 30 days prior to the start date of the academy. Although we make every effort to adhere to our schedule, extenuating circumstance may cause Missouri River Relief to cancel a program, in which case a full refund will be issued.



River Communities

The Missouri River, North America's longest river, flows on the eastern edge of both Omaha, Nebraska and St. Charles, Missouri. Both workshops will spend their time exploring the Missouri River by a motorboat while using these communities as a backdrop to learn more about the ecology, history, and stewardship.

Omaha, Nebraska Workshop

Founded in 1854, the city of Omaha has always been a dynamic and energetic city. Named after an American Indian Tribe, Omaha means "Those going against the wind or current". This workshop will highlight the Omaha riverfront which has experienced tremendous growth with a one-of-a-kind pedestrian bridge S-curves its way across the Missouri River, the signature, cable-stayed Bob Kerrey Bridge is one of the longest pedestrian bridge projects ever constructed, giving participants a breathtaking view as we pass under the bridge by motor-boat and view the bridge from a different perspective.



We will also be spending time exploring The Wetland Learning Center at Fontenelle Forest, a 1,400-acre forest, located near Bellevue, Nebraska. The Fontenelle Forest features include hiking trails, a nature center, a gift shop, and picnic facilities. The forest is listed as a National Natural Landmark and a National Historic District. This workshop will highlight the hardwood deciduous forest, extensive floodplain, and loess hills.

St. Charles, Missouri Workshop

Just west of St. Louis you'll find St. Charles, a river city with a unique historical perspective, beautiful sites, friendly people and a pace just a little slower than that of the big city. Founded as Les Petites Cotes (The Little



Hills) by French Canadian fur trader Louis Blanchette, Saint Charles, MO grew into a thriving riverfront trading center for a young America.

Thousands passed through on their journeys westward, replenishing supplies before departing into new territory. Saint Charles is a source of historical encounter: the Lewis and Clark Rendezvous, Missouri's First State Capitol, origin of the Boone's Lick Trail and home to Daniel Boone. During the workshop you'll find St. Charles offers the history and beauty of a city that has strong roots in
